

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Please take a moment to read this letter from our School Board President, Scott Wilson.

My name is Scott Wilson and I am the current Board President. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you the reasons the Board voted to put this bond on the 2024 ballot.

It is important to know that bond measures take a supermajority to pass. In this case, it takes 60% +1 vote to pass. Louisa-Muscatine has not had a voter approved bond since the 90s for the construction of the Elementary building. The school district has used its 1% sales tax wisely over the years to keep the school up to date. Most projects that use revenue from 1% sales tax dollars are under four million dollars. Any project over four million would put the school district in a position where it must choose between buses, furniture, technology, or facilities. Because this is an \$11 million dollar project, we are asking our voters to approve this.

The Board also realizes that inflation has been an issue for our property owners but at the same time we know that the longer we wait, the more it will cost.

Here are the reasons why the Board would like the voters to approve a bond for a new gym and locker rooms.

- 1. Activity space. Louisa Muscatine has added many new activities and more participants. Examples include dance, girls wrestling, larger cheer groups and color guard. Practice space is at a premium at school, by having an additional gym we can hold more practices simultaneously. This allows our high school teams to practice right after school rather than having to wait for a free time slot. Giving them more time after practice to study or work. This also helps the youth league programs gain access to gymnasium space. Many times our elementary kids have to wait till late hours to practice.
- Band and chorus space. A larger gym with doubling our seating capacity would mean more space for our students and audience. If you have been to a winter or spring concert, you know what I am talking about.
- Seating capacity and new basketball regulations. Regulations for basketball have changed over the years, and because our bleachers are so close to the sidelines, the first row of our bleachers cannot be used during games. Increasing the sidelines for basketball allows more safety for players and spectators.
- Handicap and ease of access. We cannot provide any additional handicap
 accessibilities or improvements like handrails without reducing capacity.

Facts about our gym

- Original gym built in 1960s
- Seating was reduced in the mid 90s with new bleachers. These are the beachers we currently have.
- The current gym has the smallest seating capacity in the SEISC but LM is the 3rd largest school. In some cases we seat half compared to other smaller schools. Gyms with larger seating include Winfield, Columbus, Wapello, Lone Tree, Mediapolis. See table below.

 Due to locker room door locations in the current gym, we lose space to seat another 150 spectators.

The Board is asking the voters to consider the issues above when voting for the bond measure on the November ballot.

The Board plans to use existing and future funds to cover \$3.5 million of the \$11 million project. This will provide taxpayers with a lower burden of this project. The elementary building was paid off in 2012 and if this bond passes, taxpayers of Louisa Muscatine will still have a lower rate compared to neighboring districts. Louisa-Muscatine has one of the lowest rates in southeast lowa. Louisa-Muscatine is the smallest ask of all the school bond referendums in lowa this November (see table below). The Board takes this bond measure seriously and the potential burden it puts on our residents. The Board believes we have done everything we can to keep the costs down and provide a facility that allows the students and community to enjoy.

If you have questions about how your property tax will be impacted, please contact me or the school district office. We have some tax tables that provide an estimate on the tax impact. Of course, these are estimates and do not take into account all the tax credits you are eligible for.

NEW GYM AND LOCKER ROOM CONSIDERATION

The L-M Board of Directors has approved a vote on a general obligation (GO) bond resolution of \$8,895,000 for a competitive secondary school gym with locker rooms. This will be on the ballot during the November 5, 2024, general election. The project costs \$11,241,600, with \$8,895,000 coming from the GO bond and the remaining \$2,346,600 indebtedness designated as a PPEL/SAVE expenditure.

Our competitors have practice, competition, and performance advantages over our students at L-M. None of our facilities are large enough to effectively run a two-court practice. Having only two gyms in the district with no auditorium is a huge detriment to programs. We currently attempt to share our two gyms between junior high athletics, senior high athletics, youth league athletics, community events, play practice/performances, band practice/performances, dance practice/performance, cheerleading, flag practice/performance, choir practice/performance, numerous club events (FFA, BPS & FCCLA), and other school events. Our JH/SH gym seating capacity is not large enough to allow all our student body to sit on one side of the gym to accommodate assemblies or guest speakers. As you can see from the following chart, our competitors do not have these limitations.

Below, you will find how our gym/auditorium quantity and varsity gym seating capacity compare to our competitors.

The Louisa-Muscatine High School gym was completed in 1964 with a seating capacity of 600 for a high school (9-12) with 160 students. Bleachers were replaced in 1995, reducing the seating capacity to 540 (-60) due to adding walkways. In 2014 handicapped cutouts were implemented, resulting in our current 530 seating capacity gym. The current bleachers have less than ten years of life left in them. With required handicapped modifications and recommended spacing between the basketball court and the first row, it is possible that we lose an additional 80 seats with new bleachers resulting in a seating capacity of 460 with a projected JH/SH (7-12) student population of 350.

A NEW GYM MEANS!

- 1. L-M will have the same seating capacity as Highland, Mediapolis, and West Liberty.
- 2. L-M will be able to have assemblies with all the staff and student body on one side of the gym.
- 3. With two gyms, the fine arts programs and clubs (FFA, BPS, & FCCLA) will have more accessibility to gym space for practice, performance, events, and contests.
- 4. The new gym will be prime for youth practice, programming, and tournaments.
- 5. There will be a designated gym for Junior High PE classes and Senior High PE classes.
- 6. There will be a separation of Junior High and Senior High locker rooms.
- 7. Practice space would become the equivalent of our competitors.
- 8. More practice space allows youth league teams to practice earlier and get home.
- 9. L-M would have the gym space to host large tournaments and have enough seating for both spectators and athletes.
- 10. L-M would have the seating capacity to be eligible to host sub-state play in volleyball, basketball, and wrestling.
- 11. The new gym is in an area that would be conducive to open gyms for the students and the general public.
- 12. It would be a source of pride for the school and community.

WHAT ARE OTHER DISTRICTS ASKING FOR?

A Louisa-Muscatine board has yet to ask the district's citizens to vote on a GO bond since the building of the elementary school in 1992. A school district can only go before the local voters with a bonding question during the November 5th general election. Below are the known districts that will ask their voters to consider a property tax bond this fall. The amount of the bond is also given. As you can see, the Louisa-Muscatine board is cognizant of what they ask local taxpayers to consider. We are asking less of our property owners than any other district asks in the state.
